RESIDENT RESOURCE: Important Stuff to Know


BACKYARD (RECREATIONAL) FIRES are allowed when:

- The base of the fire does not exceed 3' in diameter
- Flames do not exceed 2' in height
- Fire is contained in a fire ring of noncombustible material
- Fire ring is located at least 25' from any structure
- Water source is in close proximity
- Fire is attended until extinguished
- Burn only clean, dry wood; do not burn treated lumber, leaves, trash, furniture, etc.
- Fire may not produce smoke that causes discomfort or a negative impact to neighboring properties.

BRUSH DISPOSAL. From mid-April to October, for a nominal fee, you may take branches and brush, under 8" in diameter, to Oakdale Public Works, 1900 Hadley, during regular business hours (M-F, 7:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.). Please call 651-730-2740 for rate information.

CALL 811 BEFORE DIGGING. Call "811" at least 48 hours before disturbing soil or doing any excavating in your yard.

CODE RED. Washington County's "Code Red" emergency notification system allows for automated messages to be sent to the entire county, select cities, or to designated areas or neighborhoods within minutes. The system will only be used for emergency purposes or notification of information considered to be vitally important. Please take a moment to register by going to the Code Red link at www.ci.oakdale.mn.us. Persons without internet access are encouraged to use computers at the Oakdale Library, 1010 Heron Avenue.

 **DOG AND CAT LICENSES.** Several times a year, lost pets are picked up by the police department. Lucky pets are wearing their city-issued license and their owners are easily contacted. The unlucky ones go to the local shelter where they wait for their family to claim them. Even house pets can wander away and wearing a license may be their only form of communication.

In Oakdale, each dog or cat over six months of age needs to possess a current city-issued license. License fee is either \$12 for spayed/neutered pets or \$20. Licenses are available at 1584 Hadley Avenue, during regular business hours (owner needs to present a certificate of current rabies vaccination) or at the Vaccination Clinic. City-issued licenses expire March 31.

GARAGE SALES. Each property may have a total of three garage sales per year; with each sale running no more than four days. This includes participation in the citywide sales.

GARAGE SALES - CITYWIDE: April 30, May 1 and 2. Register by calling Cathy at 651-739-5086 by April 24.

HOUSE NUMBERS. Time is of the essence when emergency personnel are searching for your home or business. That is why exterior address numbers need to be visible from the street, a minimum of 4" in height, and located near the primary entrance.

HYDRANT FLUSHING. Each spring, Public Works crews flush out the fire hydrants in the city to remove sediment. During this process, there could be a slight drop in pressure and water from your faucet may be discolored for a brief period.

LOAD LIMITS. During the spring thaw, streets are weakened by water trapped below the pavement. Weight restrictions are implemented to help minimize wear and to allow the base time to stabilize. During this time, please advise contractors and delivery providers to comply with posted load limits for city streets.

MAILBOXES. Please install mailboxes as follows: minimum

height of the mailbox (not the post) needs to be at least 45" from the gutter channel. The face of the mailbox should not extend beyond the back edge of the curb.

MAIL DELIVERY. Vehicles are not to park within 10 feet of either side of any mailbox between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday.

ONE STOP DROP FOR DONATIONS. The following items are collected at City Hall during regular business hours:

- Cellphones
- Christmas Lights
- Hearing Aids
- Nonperishable food and personal hygiene items
- Prescription eyeglasses and prescription sunglasses
- US Flags - any size, any condition

PROPERTY COMPLAINTS. Have a concern with or complaint about a neighboring property? Call 651-702-5225. Please note that you need to live within 200' of the subject property -- or be able to see it from your property. All complaints are anonymous.


PROPERTY VALUATION MEETING. If you have a concern with the value of your property, the process for having it reviewed is to attend the Washington County Property Valuation Meeting on April 8 at City Hall, 1584 Hadley Avenue, from 5 to 7 p.m. Questions? Please call the assessor at 651-702-5231.

RECREATIONAL EQUIPMENT NEAR/IN STREETS. For safety reasons, recreational equipment (basketball hoops, hoop foundations, hockey nets, etc.) is not to be placed -- temporarily or permanently -- in the right-of-way or boulevard areas of your yard, or in public streets.

RECREATIONAL VEHICLES. Throughout the year, each property is allowed to keep one recreational vehicle outside; whether it's in the side or rear yard (at least 5' from property line) or on the driveway (snowmobiles from November 1 to April 30; other vehicles from May 1 to November 1). Having more recreational vehicles is fine provided only one is outside and the others are hibernating inside the garage or at off-site storage. Questions? Please call 651-702-5225.

SUMP PUMPS - PLEASE ROUTE OUT! The flow that enters the sanitary sewer system through toilets, wash tubs, and floor drains is sent to the treatment plant in Saint Paul. The flow is metered and Oakdale is charged accordingly. The city, and in turn, our utility customers, pay for additional flow. If you use a sump pump, please note that it is illegal to discharge sump pumps into the sewer system. Route discharge outside to your yard, the street, the storm sewer, or waterway. If your sump pump needs to discharge into the sewer system, even temporarily, please call 651-730-2710 to make arrangements.

TRASH CONTAINER REMINDER. Except on collection day, garbage/trash and recycling containers need to be stored on the side or back of your house/garage or inside the garage or shed, just not in front of your property. Questions? Please call 651-730-2727.

 **VACCINATION CLINIC FOR DOGS AND CATS.** Century Animal Clinic, 839 Century Avenue (Maplewood). Pay only for vaccinations -- *no office visit charge is applied!* Oakdale-issued licenses will also be sold at the event. Watch the city's web site for date and time of clinic.

WILDLIFE AND WATER FOWL. Please remember that the feeding of wildlife and water fowl is not allowed. Bird feeders need to be at least 5' above the ground or structure.

UTILITY BILL PAYMENT OPTIONS AND RATES

Auto Bank Payments. Have utility bills automatically deducted from your bank account on the bill's due date each billing cycle by completing the "Automatic Utility Payment Application" provided on the Utility Billing page at www.ci.oakdale.mn.us. Please mail completed form to the Oakdale Finance Department, 1584 Hadley Avenue, Oakdale, MN 55128.

Drop Payment in Drop Box. Payments made by check or credit card can be placed in the drive-up drop box located in the City Hall parking lot. Please place your payment, along with the stub from your utility bill, in a sealed envelope before depositing into the drop box.

Mail. Mail your check and the stub from your utility bill. Or, fill out the section for a credit card payment on your utility bill stub and mail to us.

Pay In Person. Bring cash, a check or credit card to the first floor counter at City Hall, 1584 Hadley Avenue, Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Pay by Phone with Credit Card. Call 651-730-2716 or 1-877-885-7968 to provide your credit card information during regular business hours (M-F, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.). No fee is applied for credit card payments.

Senior or Disabled Person Discounts are available for qualified individuals with a total annual household income of \$45,500 or less. There are no base charges, the sewer charge is for actual usage during the winter quarter. Seniors must be 62 or older and the primary resident at the service address. Call 651-730-2716.

FOREST GARDEN ANOTHER HIDDEN GEM IN THE CITY

We've all heard of rain gardens, vegetable gardens, flower gardens, and butterfly gardens, but have you heard of a forest garden? Well, Oakdale has one! You may have seen it on your walks and jogs through the Oakdale Nature Preserve. It is located on .57 acres in the heart of the park, on the southern edge of Mud Lake – actually on the southern peninsula of the lake. You may have noticed the arbor, which is the entrance to the garden.

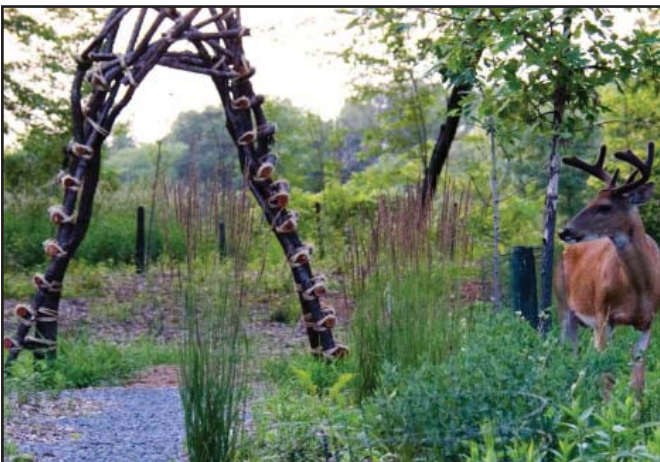
All gardens have a purpose (produce food, attract butterflies, or help with water flow, for example), and Oakdale's Forest Garden is no different. The purpose of this garden is to "garden the way a forest would do it," explained Chris Larson, City Forester. "A forest has multiple layers – vines, shrubs, ground covers, a low tree layer, higher tree layers that attract birds, and vegetation that will bring in different mammals and lizards and provide overwintering sites for insects. Basically, it's putting plants together in a woodland-like pattern to form mutually beneficial relationships and ultimately creating a garden system that is more than the sum of the parts."

The site was identified for a Forest Garden in 2013, and 70 volunteers planted trees, shrubs and other vegetation during the spring 2014 community tree planting project. The plants should be thriving by 2016.

Goals of the forest garden include showing visitors what they can do in their own yards and creating an aesthetically pleasing area for the public to observe wildlife. The spiral path has drawn a lot of attention with people thinking it is a labyrinth. "That wasn't the idea, at all," Larson explained. "The spiral path simply provides a lot more edges for us to plant a variety of materials!"

In the future, park visitors can look forward to seeing how the vegetation changes over the seasons, wisteria and grapevines growing over the arbor, fully developed fruit vegetation (apple and pear trees and blueberry, strawberry and raspberry vines), educational materials and videos, and a boardwalk connecting the south peninsula with the north peninsula across Mud Lake.

The forest garden is located in the Oakdale Nature Preserve, which is adjacent to the Discovery Center at 4444 Hadley Avenue.

BOARDWALK PLANNED FOR OAKDALE NATURE PRESERVE

This winter, while Mud Lake is frozen, borings will be drilled and soil samples taken that will help determine the design of footings for a boardwalk that will connect the north and south peninsulas of the lake, located in the Oakdale Nature Preserve. According to City Engineer Brian Bachmeier, the design of the boardwalk will be developed in the spring and summer of 2015, bids will be accepted in the fall, and construction will take place in the winter of 2015-2016. The boardwalk will be ready for enjoying the spring bloom early in 2016, and it will be ready for use as soon as the ice is out.

SIGN OF THE TIMES

Electronic speed indicator signs were recently installed on Helmo Avenue, near the intersection of 19th Street.

In the past two years, one family experienced two rear-end accidents as they were turning into their driveway; one of the incidents resulted in a fatality of a family member.

The new signs, one south-facing and one north-facing, identify the speed a vehicle is traveling in relation to the posted speed, which is 30 miles per hour in that section of Helmo.



SNOW BUSINESS

Reminder: No On-Street Parking 12 to 5 a.m.

- **FIRE HYDRANT - IF IT'S NEAR, KEEP IT CLEAR!** As a service to the firefighters -- and to your neighborhood, please consider adopting the nearest hydrants by keeping it cleared of snow and maintaining a path from the street to the hydrant. Thank you for your help!
- **FROZEN PIPES.** Prolonged low temperatures and the increased depth of frost in the ground increases the likelihood of water pipes freezing. Frozen pipes are at risk of expanding and rupturing and causing an interruption of water service to your property. This situation is particularly true for slab-on-grade structures and split entry homes. By monitoring your water service, you may be able to determine if the water service to your home or business is beginning to experience difficulties. One sign is seeing discolored water when you turn on the faucet. Another is a water temperature below 40 degrees. (Tip: to determine the water temperature, hold an instant read or kitchen thermometer under running water or immediately insert the thermometer into a water filled glass). One way to lessen the chance of frozen pipes is to run a faucet at a slow trickle to keep water flowing through the pipes. If you have questions, or if you have utilized the services of a pipe thawing company, please call the city at 651-501-5309 or 651-730-2710.
- **KEEPING STREETS CLEAR.** Please don't risk a fine by blowing, shoveling, pushing, or blowing snow into a plowed or yet to be plowed street.
- **MAILBOX OR SOD DAMAGE.** Properly installed mailboxes (see city's web site or call 651-730-2740) accidentally toppled by the blade of a snowplow will be replaced by city crews as soon as time allows. The city reserves the right to determine whether a mailbox was damaged by a plow or due to existing deterioration of the post. Report damage via the form at www.ci.oakdale.mn.us or calling 651-730-2740.
- **TRASH CONTAINERS.** On trash collection day, please remember to place rubbish and recycling containers on your driveway approval, behind the curb, just prior to 7 a.m.
- **PLOW SAFETY.** A snowplow, loaded with sand, weighs 33,000 pounds. In comparison, the average vehicle weighs only 3,000 pounds. Please take care to stay at least 70' back from a snowplow.
- **PARKING.** Winter parking guidelines remain in place until April 1 -- no matter how much, or how little, snow falls. During this time, vehicles parked on city streets from 12 a.m. to 5 a.m. each day need to be removed. Also, any time there is an accumulated snowfall of 2" or more, parked vehicles need to remain off city streets until the full width of the roadway has been plowed.

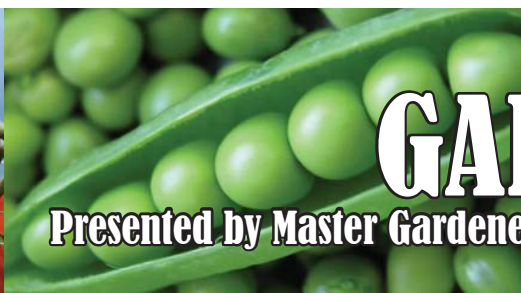

Snowmobile Regulations:

To operate a snowmobile within the city limits of Oakdale, the following guidelines need to be followed:

You may not operate a snowmobile in any public park, on any public sidewalk, bikeway/pedway, or on school grounds. Snowmobiles are not allowed on public boulevards.

You may only operate a snowmobile during the hours of 9 a.m. and 10 p.m. Sunday – Thursday, and 9 a.m. and 1 a.m. Friday, Sunday, and any evening preceding a holiday.

SWIM CLASS DESCRIPTIONS

(Refer to Schedule on Pages 15 and 16)

INFANT AND PRESCHOOL - Classes are 30 minutes long

- **Mini Tots** (swim diapers please) *Infants 6 months to 2 years with parent* Parent works with child to promote water readiness through games and play.
- **Tiny Tots** (swim diapers, if needed) *Toddlers 2 to 4 years with parent* Parent works with child to learn basic swim skills through group activities.
- **Preschoolers + Parents** *3 to 5 years with parent* Previous experience in our mini or tiny tot classes, or a child who is comfortable and will put their face in the water. Parent will help their child learn basic swim skills through drills and play.
- **Turtles (Preschool 1)** *4 to 5 year olds without a parent* Preschoolers who will not put their face in the water. Class introduces them to basic swim skills and increases their comfort level.
- **Bobbers (Preschool 2)** *4 to 5 year olds without a parent* Preschoolers who are comfortable and will put their face in the water. Basic swim skills will be taught.
- **Super Kids (Preschool 3)** *4 to 5 year olds without a parent* Preschoolers who can swim 10 feet with their face in the water. Super Kids often have fundamental swim skills but are not ready for the larger class size and longer class time in Level 1.

RED CROSS (6 yrs and older) - Classes are 55 minutes long

- **Levels 1 and 2** – Entry level class for ages 6 and older. Swimmers will develop a good foundation of water adjustment, movement, and safety. Skills will include assisted and independent floating and gliding on front and back; and alternating leg and arm movements for a combined stroke on front and back.
- **Level 3** – Passed Level 2 or have equivalent skills. Skills will include front crawl and elementary backstroke with emphasis on endurance and improving stroke proficiency. Students will also be introduced to deep water swimming and butterfly body motion.
- **Level 4** – Passed Level 3 or have equivalent skills. Focus will be on refining the front crawl and elementary backstroke with attention to detail and developing endurance. In addition, breaststroke, butterfly, back crawl, sidestroke, and open turns will also be taught.
- **Level 5** – Refined coordination and improved endurance of all previous strokes are key emphasis at this level. Flip turns and multiple surface dives are introduced.
- **Level 6** – The majority of the lesson will be the same for both Personal Water Safety and Fitness Swimmer classes. Emphasis will be on core strokes to improve power, efficiency, and endurance over greater distances and length of time.
 - 6pws – Personal Water Safety.** Skills include self-rescue techniques, survival float, and survival swimming.
 - 6fs – Fitness Swimmer.** Learn principles to increase and evaluate your fitness.

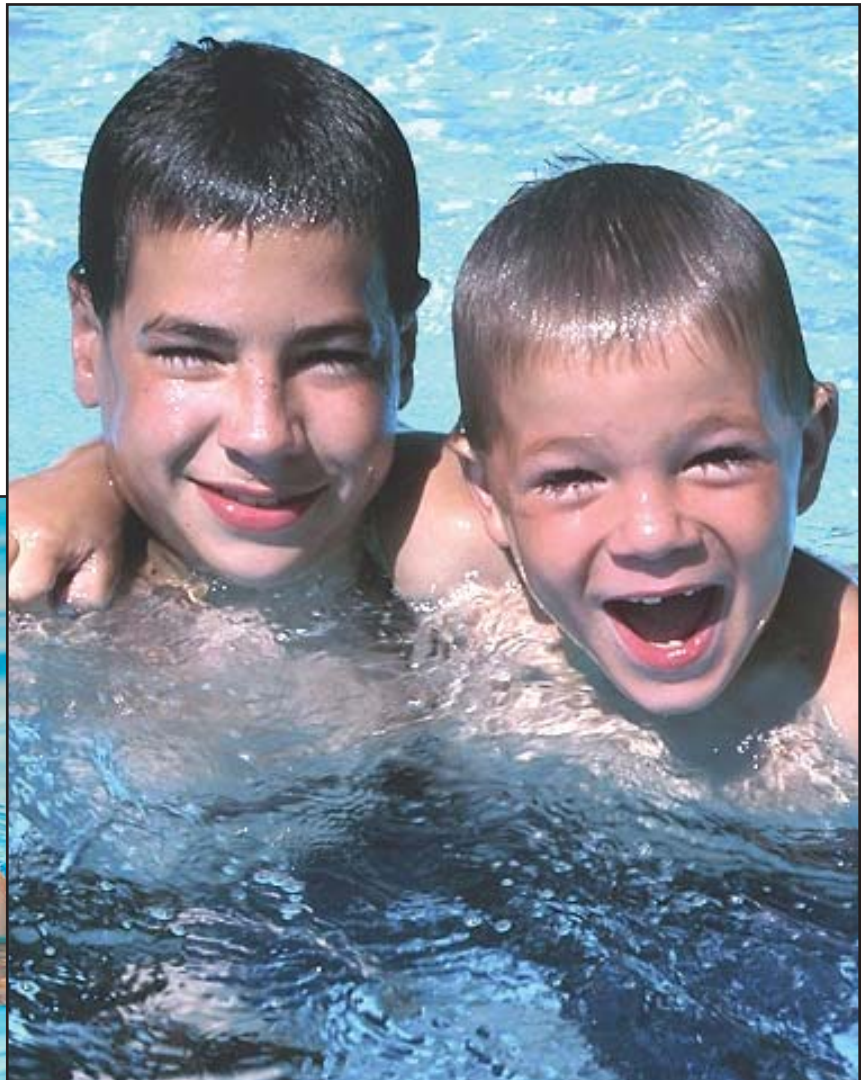

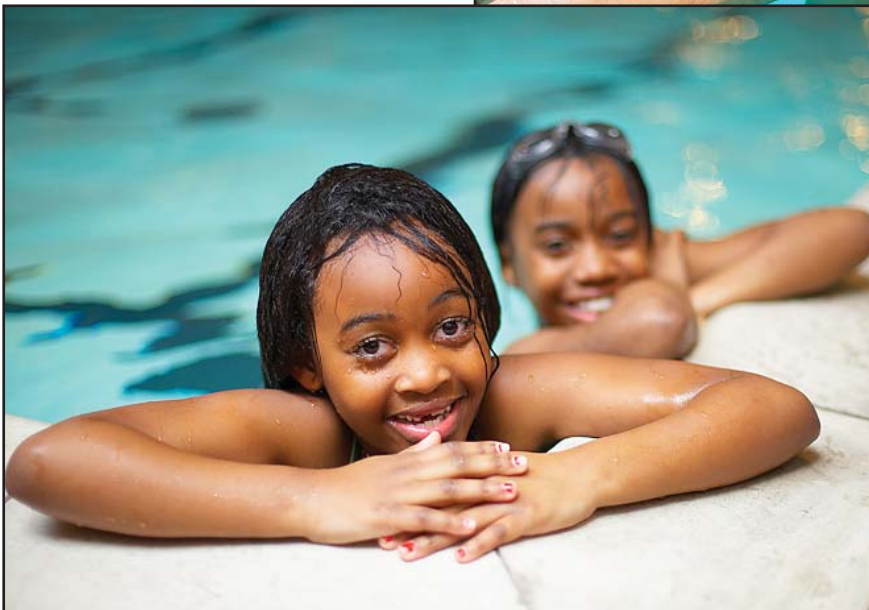

For 13 consecutive years, volunteers have removed buckthorn from the Oakdale Nature Preserve during the annual Scott Carver Memorial Buckthorn Removal. This year, on October 11, nearly 70 volunteers removed buckthorn from 1.5 acres of the park and opened up some scenic views. In addition to the volunteers, thanks go to the Washington County Master Gardeners, North High School, Oakdale Public Works, and the Oakdale City Council, as well as Prom Catering and Stiglich Construction for the refreshments and the thank you lunch. The event was coordinated by the Oakdale Tree Board and is named in honor of Scott Carver, an ardent supporter of buckthorn removal. Scott was chair of the Oakdale Tree Board and died in October, 2004.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR TANNERS LAKE PARK PROJECT!

TIME TO PLAN YOUR RAIN GARDEN!

With spring just around the corner, now is a good time to consider installing a rain garden on your property! There are many benefits to having a rain garden. They include:

- increasing the amount of water that filters into the ground, which recharges local and regional aquifers;
- helping protect communities from flooding and drainage problems;
- helping protect streams and lakes from pollutants carried by urban stormwater – lawn fertilizers and pesticides, oil and other fluids that leak from cars, and numerous harmful substances that wash off roofs and paved areas;
- enhancing the beauty of yards and neighborhoods;
- providing valuable habitat for birds, butterflies and many beneficial insects.

Oakdale has an educational packet on the basic steps for designing and building a rain garden. Go to www.ci.oakdale.mn.us/, point to Generation Green and click on water quality. IT'S GOOD TO RECYCLE!

Did you know:

- 20 percent of recyclable materials are thrown into the garbage annually;
- there is a state goal for 45-48 percent of all household waste to be recycled by 2015;
- the Washington County average will have to increase to 647-715 pounds per household to meet the state goal;
- Oakdale averaged 509 pounds per household in 2012.

It's a good thing to recycle! Here are the top reasons for doing it:

It's Good for Our Economy.

American companies rely on recycling programs to provide raw materials to make new products. The Office of the Federal Environmental Executive estimates more than \$100 billion in revenue comes from recycling.

It Creates Jobs. Recycling in the US is a \$236 billion a year industry. More than 56,000 recycling and reuse enterprises employ 1.1 million workers nationwide.

It Reduces the Need for Landfills.

The average American discards almost four and a half pounds of garbage every day; most goes into landfills.

It's Good for the Environment.

Recycling promotes sustainable use of natural resources, prevents pollution, reduces greenhouse gas emissions, and promotes community development.

It Saves Energy. Recycling offers significant energy savings over manufacturing with virgin materials. Recycling in the U.S. saved 1.3 quadrillion BTUs of energy in 2009, which is equivalent to 224 million barrels of oil.

It Prevents Climate Change. In 2009, recycling and composting of solid waste prevented the release of 178 million metric tons of carbon equivalent (MMTCE, the unit of measure for greenhouse gases) into the air. This is comparable to the total annual greenhouse gas emissions from 33 million passenger vehicles.

It Reduces Water Pollution. Making goods from recycled materials generates far less water pollution than manufacturing from virgin materials.

It Protects Wildlife. Using recycled materials reduces the need to damage forests, wetlands, rivers and other places essential to wildlife.

It Creates New Demand. Recycling and buying recycled products creates demand for more recycled products, decreasing waste and helping our economy.

If you don't recycle, please start! If you are already a recycler, be sure you are recycling all you can! Ask your hauler what all they accept.

KEEP SPRING RUN-OFF CLEAN

When the snow melts, please take these simple steps to keep our lakes and other waterways clean and healthy.

- Direct water from downspouts onto the lawn, away from your house and paved surfaces.
- Remove debris (leaves, branches, trash) from the storm drains near your home, particularly after a rainstorm.
- Avoid raking debris (leaves, grass, sand and dirt) from your lawn into the street.
- Sweep up and reuse any lawn care products that fall on streets, sidewalks and driveways.
- Clean your lawn and garden equipment on the grass, rather than on hard surfaces, in the gutter, or over storm drains.
- Sweep up soil and grass clippings. Never wash or blow them into the street.

WATERSHED RECOGNIZES OAKDALE RESIDENTS

Two Oakdale residents have received Watershed Excellence Awards from the Ramsey-Washington Metro Watershed District for their "exemplary" contributions.

The Youth Engagement Award went to Oakdale resident Ginny Newman, along with Bev Blomgren. They provided grants and support to cover bus transportation, school garden demonstration projects, education projects, neighborhood rain garden construction and shoreline restoration. Strong advocates for watershed education at the school district level, they also encouraged teachers to make watershed awareness a part of classroom curriculum. They fostered community involvement on projects around the District including the Lake Phalen, Keller and Keller Golf Course restorations and church rain garden projects.

The Outstanding Partner Award was presented to Brian Nelson of Nelco Landscaping. As the landscaping contractor for the Carol Matheys Center for Children and Families in Oakdale, Brian not only designed and installed a rain garden and pavers for the center, but involved the children and their families in the planting and learning about storm water, rain gardens and plants. He helped the center "become stewards of the landscape." Brian also worked with the Washington Conservation District to design landscape features in their new office in Oakdale, including a pervious green "overflow" parking lot with an adjacent bioretention basin and native plantings. Brian credited his work experience with Metro Blooms and the influences of his mentor Rusty Schmidt and others in the field with helping him shift his priorities to "working on sustainable projects that have the capacity to reap positive impacts 100 years down the road."

RE-THINK RECYCLING How to Extend the Life of a Small Appliance

We always talk about waste management's three Rs: reduce, reuse and recycle. For small appliances, such as blenders, coffee makers, toasters, and curling irons, you can add a fourth R: repair.

Small appliances that are not working often simply need minor repairs or parts replaced, so consider troubleshooting and repair options before getting rid of the item.

Hennepin County offers monthly "fix-it clinics" during which you can get household items fixed for free, and you can learn repair skills from volunteers who will guide you through the repair process. You do not need to be a resident of Hennepin County to participate. You must be able to carry items in, and you may bring any tools and supplies you think might help with the job, but it is not mandatory. Clinics are on the second Saturday of each month from noon to 4 p.m. at the Eden Prairie Library, 565 Prairie Center Dr., Eden Prairie. (Exception: the April clinic will be April 18). For more information, go to www.hennepin.us/FixItClinic.

You also can learn how to repair small appliances by going online to www.howstuffworks.com and typing "repair small appliances" in the search box. In addition, many businesses in the Twin Cities repair lamps and other small appliances. An online search will point you in the right direction.

Now, back to two of the other "Rs" – Reduce and Reuse. Before you buy a new small appliance, try shopping at consignment and second-hand shops. You also can try purchasing at online resale outlets like Craigslist.

If you have a small appliance in good working condition that you no longer need, contact a local charity to ask about donating it. Also consider online resale sites for reselling working appliances.

A fourth option for your small appliance that is not working is to Recycle it. The Recycling Zone in Eagan accepts small appliances for free from Twin Cities residents.

Best Buy accepts many appliances at no charge, not including small kitchen appliances, no matter where they were purchased. Hair dryers and curling items are examples of personal care items accepted. See BestBuy.com for details. Most locations that recycle major appliances, such as refrigerators, ovens, washers and dryers, will not accept small appliances, but you may call for information about items they may accept. If you are purchasing a new small appliance, ask the retailer if they will recycle your old appliance.

Finally, if none of the above options is viable for your small appliance, contact your trash service provider to confirm which items can be placed in the trash. If your small appliance is cordless, remove and recycle the batteries before placing the appliance in the trash. Rechargeable batteries may contain hazardous or rare metals. If improperly disposed, they can pollute the air, land and water. Rechargeable batteries can be recovered and recycled to make new products. Bring rechargeable batteries to most hardware stores or to the Washington County Environmental Center, 4039 Cottage Grove Drive, in Woodbury.
