RESIDENT RESOURCE: Important Stuff to Know

BACKYARD (RECREATIONAL) FIRES are allowed when:

- The base of the fire does not exceed 3' in diameter
- Flames do not exceed 2' in height
- Fire is contained in a fire ring of noncombustible material
- Fire ring is located at least 25' from any structure
- Water source is in close proximity
- Fire is attended until extinguished
- Burning only clean, dry wood; not treated lumber, leaves, trash, furniture, etc.
- Fire does not produce smoke that causes discomfort or a negative impact to neighboring properties.

BEYOND THE YELLOW RIBBON. As a Yellow Ribbon City, Oakdale assists members of the military and their families with errands to home maintenance. To learn more, please call Marc Cove at 651-332-5222.

BRUSH DISPOSAL. From mid-April to October, for a nominal fee, you may take branches and brush, under 8" in diameter, to Oakdale Public Works, 1900 Hadley, Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Please call 651-730-2740 for rates.

CODE RED. Washington County's "Code Red" emergency notification system allows for automated messages to be sent to the entire county, select cities, or to designated areas or neighborhoods within minutes. To register, select the Code Red link at www.ci.oakdale.mn.us.

DIAL-A-RIDE TRANSPORTATION. Transit Link offers transportation and is intended to serve areas where regular transit route service is not available. Transit Link is available from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday to Friday. To reserve a ride, please call 651-602-5465 up to five business days in advance.

FREE CABLE (channels 6, 14, 15, 16 (local government access), 20, 95, and 98). Call 651-747-3801 and ask for the free "Universal Coverage Channels".

GARAGE SALES. Each property may have a total of three garage sales per year; with each sale running no more than four days. This includes participation in the citywide sales.

HOUSE NUMBERS. Time is of the essence when emergency personnel are searching for your home or business. That is why exterior address numbers need to be visible from the street, a minimum of 4" in height, and located near the primary entrance.

HYDRANT FLUSHING. Each spring, Public Works crews flush out the fire hydrants in the city to remove sediment. During this process, there could be a slight drop in pressure and water from your faucet may be discolored for a brief period.

IRRIGATION SYSTEM TIPS FOR HOMES AND BUSINESSES. Irrigate only when necessary; one inch of water per week, including rainfall, is all that's needed to maintain a healthy lawn. Turn off your system's automatic setting and irrigate only when the grass needs water. Contact your irrigation contractor to discuss water saving options and newer technologies. Finally, inspect your system for defective or missing sprinkler heads to ensure that water is reaching all designated zones.

LOAD LIMITS. During the spring thaw, streets are weakened by water trapped below the pavement. Weight restrictions are implemented to help minimize wear and to allow the base time to stabilize. During this time, please advise contractors and delivery providers to comply with posted load limits for city streets.

MAILBOXES. Please install mailboxes as follows: minimum height of the mailbox (not the post) needs to be at least 45" from the gutter channel. The face of the mailbox should not extend beyond the back edge of the curb.

MAIL DELIVERY. Vehicles are not to park within 10 feet of either side of any mailbox between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday.

PROPERTY COMPLAINTS. Have a concern with or complaint about a neighboring property? Call 651-702-5225. Please note that you need to live within 200' of the subject property -- or be able to see it from your property. All complaints are anonymous.

PROPERTY VALUATION MEETING. If you have a concern with the value of your property, the process for having it reviewed is to attend the Washington County Property Valuation Meeting on April 13 at City Hall, 1584 Hadley Avenue, from 5 to 7 p.m. Questions? Please call the assessor at 651-702-5231.

RECREATIONAL VEHICLES. Throughout the year, each property is allowed to keep one recreational vehicle outside; whether it's in the side or rear yard (at least 5' from property line) or on the driveway (snowmobiles from November 1 to April 30; other vehicles from May 1 to November 1). Having more recreational vehicles is fine provided only one is outside and the others are hibernating inside the garage or at off-site storage. Questions? Please call 651-702-5225.

SUMP PUMPS - PLEASE ROUTE OUT! The flow that enters the sanitary sewer system through toilets, wash tubs, and floor drains is sent to the treatment plant in Saint Paul. The flow is metered and Oakdale is charged accordingly. The city, and in turn, our utility customers, pay for additional flow. If you use a sump pump, please note that it is illegal to discharge sump pumps into the sewer system. Route discharge outside to your yard, the street, the storm sewer, or waterway. If your sump pump needs to discharge into the sewer system, even temporarily, please call 651-730-2710 to make arrangements.

VETERAN'S MEMORIAL. The Oakdale Veteran's Memorial is located at 1584 Hadley and honors each branch of the military. It offers a landscaped backdrop, a brick paver walkway, flags, and water features that welcome visitors to a place of honor and reflection. Order an engraved paver for any person who has served or is currently serving in the military. Oakdale residency is not required. Cost per paver: \$100.

WINTER PARKING. Winter parking guidelines remain in place until April 1 -- no matter how much, or how little, snow falls. During this time, vehicles cannot park on city streets from 12 a.m. to 5 a.m. each day. Also, any time there is an accumulated snowfall of 2" or more, parked vehicles need to remain off city streets until the full width of the roadway has been plowed.

Auto Bank Payments. Have utility bills automatically deducted from your bank account on the bill's due date each billing cycle by completing the "Automatic Utility Payment Application" provided on the Utility Billing page at www.ci.oakdale.mn.us. Please mail completed form to the Oakdale Finance Department, 1584 Hadley Avenue, Oakdale, MN 55128.

Drop Payment in Drop Box. Payments made by check or credit card can be placed in the drive-up drop box located in the City Hall parking lot. Please place your payment, along with the stub from your utility bill, in a sealed envelope before depositing into the drop box.

Mail. Mail your check and the stub from your utility bill. Or, fill out the section for a credit card payment on your utility bill stub and mail to us.

OAKDALE'S ANIMALS

CHICKENS. Interested in owning chickens? Please talk to the Oakdale Police Department about first obtaining a Special Use Permit.

DEER. Deer are beautiful, wild animals, but deer and developed areas can spell t-r-o-u-b-l-e. Deer can wreak havoc on gardens, landscaping plants, and trees and shrubs. It is also common to have motor vehicle accidents involving deer. Attracting deer to your yard with food only creates community-wide problems necessitating in the reduction of the population.

GEESE. Every year, the city receives numerous complaints about Canadian Geese and their droppings. Attracting geese to your yard with food only creates community-wide problems necessitating in the reduction of the population. Have goose problems? LEASHES. When dogs and cats leave their premises -- with their owner or a member of the household -- they need to be leashed or under other physical control. Also, dogs need to be leashed when in city parks and on other public land.

LICENSES. Several times a year, lost pets are picked up by the police department. Lucky pets are wearing their city-issued license and their owners are easily contacted. The unlucky ones go to the local shelter where they wait for their family to claim them. Even house pets can wander away and wearing a license may be their only form of communication. In Oakdale, each dog or cat over six months of age needs to possess a current city-issued license. Licenses are available at 1584 Hadley Avenue, during regular business hours (present a certificate of current rabies vaccination) or at the annual vaccination clinic. City-issued licenses expire March 31.

NUISANCES. Animals which "run at large" may be impounded by the Police Department whether they are licensed or not. It's important to remember that not everyone enjoys the company of pets - even some other pets. Please make sure that your pet(s) does not disturb others or their property.

NUMBER OF PETS. Pet owners with more than three of any single type of domestic animal, over three months old, need to obtain a Special Use Permit from the Oakdale Police Department.

SANITATION. Pet owners need to remove and properly dispose of pet droppings from their yard on a regular basis. Also, taking your pet off your property, be sure to have something with you to pick up excrement and disposing of it in a trash receptacle. You will find Mutt Mitt dispensers in city parks.

VACCINATION CLINIC (DOGS AND CATS). Century Animal Clinic, 839 Century Avenue (Maplewood). Pay only for vaccinations -- no office visit charge is applied! Oakdale-issued licenses will also be sold at the event. Watch the city's web site for date and time of clinic.

WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMALS. Interested in owning wild or exotic animals? Please talk to the Oakdale Police Department about first obtaining a Special Use Permit.

WILDLIFE AND WATER FOWL. Please remember that the feeding of wildlife and water fowl is not allowed. Bird feeders are allowed but they need to be least five feet above the ground or structure.

BE KIND TO POLLINATORS!

Pollinators are responsible for assisting over 80 percent of the world's flowering plants; and virtually all of the world's seed plants need to be pollinated. It has been estimated that one out of every three bites of food we take comes to us through the work of animal and insect pollinators. Therefore, without pollinators, humans and wildlife wouldn't have much to eat or to look at!

You might be surprised to know of all the animals, birds and insects that assist plants in their reproduction as pollinators. They include species of ants, bats, beetles, birds, butterflies, flies, moths, wasps, and, of course, bees. Vertebrates, mainly bats and birds, but also some non-bat mammals (monkeys, lemurs, possums, rodents) and some reptiles (lizards and snakes) pollinate certain plants. Among the pollinating birds are hummingbirds, honeyeaters and sunbirds with long beaks, which pollinate a number of deep-throated flowers.

AJ Moses, a member of Oakdale's Environmental Management Commission, also pointed out that the vilified mosquito also plays a role in pollination. "Wild blueberries are the primary beneficiary of the mosquito's pollination efforts!" It's also important to note that bees pollinate animal food crops, including crops for animals some people eat. "Alfalfa, for instance, isn't a primary food crop for people, but it is an important protein source for cattle and other animals, and it needs pollination."

Having established the important role pollinators play in the life cycle of plants and flowers, it behooves us to take steps to promote the good health of pollinators as well as protect their lives. AJ says the two most important things humans can do is to reduce the use of pesticides and establish plants that are friendly to all pollinators (not just honey bees).

To expand on his recommendations, here are some more suggestions:

Use a wide variety of plants that bloom from early spring into late fall. Help pollinators find and use them by planting in clumps, rather than single plants.

Avoid modern hybrid flowers, especially those with "doubled" flowers. Often plant breeders have unwittingly left the pollen, nectar, and fragrance out of these blossoms while creating the "perfect" blooms for us.

Eliminate pesticides whenever possible. If you must use a pesticide, use the least-toxic material possible. Read labels carefully before purchasing, as many pesticides are especially dangerous for bees. Use the product properly. Spray at night when bees and other pollinators are not active.

Provide a hummingbird feeder. To make artificial nectar, use four parts water to one part table sugar. Never use artificial sweeteners, honey, or fruit juices. Place something red on the feeder. Clean your feeder with hot soapy water at least twice a week to keep it free of mold.

Consider making a bee block. There are many plans available free online. Bee blocks provide a habitat for native bees, rather than honey bees. There are over 400 species of bees in Minnesota. Most are effective pollinators.

VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

Paul Dean was selected as Oakdale's "Volunteer of the Year" for 2015. Dean, an environmental teacher at North High School, was chosen for his volunteer work in Oakdale, over the past decade, removing buckthorn and landscaping in the city's parks. To his students, he serves as an example of being a good steward to the earth and encourages them to work alongside him in these volunteer efforts.

SEEKING INPUT ON BUS RAPID TRANSIT

The Gateway Corridor Gold Line BRT is a proposed bus rapid transit (BRT) line that will help ease traffic congestion in the east metro. The Gold Line is proposed to run near Interstate 94 for 12 miles, in its own lane on Hudson Road and 4th Street between the Union Depot in downtown Saint Paul, through Oakdale, and on to Manning Avenue in Woodbury/Lake Elmo.

All-day transit service would stop at 13 stations and include connections to the growing regional transit system, including connections to Minneapolis and complementing existing express commuter service like the current routes at Guardian Angles Church.

The work is led by the Gateway Corridor Commission, which is comprised of local elected officials, business and community leaders. City Council member Paul Reinke represents Oakdale on the Commission. After a few years of study, the Commission decided, in the spring of 2014, that BRT was a better

fit for the area as opposed to light-rail transit (LRT).

The Gateway Corridor team is currently completing technical analysis that will roll into the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (Draft EIS). The Draft EIS will cover a variety of social, natural and transportation issues, and will discuss the existing conditions, potential impacts and recommended mitigation measures for each.

Community meetings will be held throughout the spring and summer to discuss the results of the Draft EIS, and an official public comment period will take place this summer. Keep an eye out for information about meeting dates and other opportunities to learn more and have your voice heard.

SEEKING INPUT ON CSAH 13 (IDEAL AVENUE, OLSON LAKE TRAIL)

In July 2015, Washington County, in partnership with the cities of Lake Elmo and Oakdale, initiated a preliminary design study for County Highway 13 (Ideal Avenue/Olson Lake Trail) from County Highway 14 (Old TH 5) to County Highway 35.

The roadway is currently fraught with pavement and drainage deficiencies, erosion problems and other safety and environmental concerns. To date, the project partners have held a series of neighborhood meetings and open houses to solicit input from area residents and to discuss alternatives for this corridor. Additional public meetings will be held in early 2016 to review concept drawings in an effort to identify a well-balanced alternative that will address roadway and drainage deficiencies. Construction activities are planned for Spring/Summer 2017.

This project will provide an opportunity to:

Improve sight lines and address roadway safety concerns

Correct pavement deficiencies and shoulder widths

Analyze the current and future needs at intersections and driveways

Address erosion concerns and storm-water management

Accommodate the extension of a joint-city sanitary sewer main

Consider the lack of pedestrian/bike accommodations along the corridor

Nordic walking is an exercise form with many advantages, both for the healthy individual needing a more vigorous exercise form, especially for cardiovascular benefits, and for an individual with restrictions from a medical condition that precludes jogging or running. It can also be advantageous for those with medical conditions of arthritic or neurological origin that make normal walking without support difficult. Adult sizes available. 

Trail Etiquette

Be Predictable. Travel in a consistent and predictable manner. Always look behind before changing positions on the trail.

Be Courteous. All trail users, including bicyclists, joggers, walkers, wheelchairs, skateboarders, bladers and skaters, should be respectful of other users regardless of their mode, speed or level of skill.

Keep Right. Stay as near to the right side of the trail as is safe, except when passing another user.

Pass On The Left. Pass others, going your direction, on their left. Yield to slower and oncoming traffic. Use hand signals to alert those behind you of your moves. Look ahead and back to make sure the lane is clear before you pull out and pass. Pass with ample separation and do not move back to the right until safely past. It is important to note that kids and pets can be unpredictable.

Give Audible Warning Before Passing. Give a clear signal by using voice, bell or horn before passing. Give the person you are passing time to respond. Watch for their reaction. So that you can hear these signals, don't wear headphones on the trail.

Obey All Traffic Signs And Signals. Use extra caution where trails cross streets. Stop at all signs and intersections and be cautious when crossing driveways. When entering or crossing a trail yield to traffic on the trail.

Clean Up Litter. Do not leave glass, paper, cans, plastic, or any other debris on or near a trail.



THANK YOU VOLUNTEERS!



Over 60 volunteers (including a contingent from North High School) made “a huge impact” on Eberle Park when they helped clear buckthorn last fall. City Forester Chris Larson said their work will restore diversity to Eberle Park’s forest. The 2015 Scott Carver Buckthorn Removal Event, held October 10, was “a tremendous success,” Larson said, because of the large volume of buckthorn biomass that was removed from the park. Approximately 55 yards of buckthorn was chipped on site, and approximately 17 yards of buckthorn brush was hauled away! Special thanks also go to Hy-Vee and Stiglich Construction for providing refreshments and food for a thank-you lunch for volunteers.

JUMP START SPRING COMPOSTING WITH COMPOST BINS, RAIN BARRELS

You can reduce waste and decrease your water consumption by using a compost bin or rain barrel at your home.

Composting is a great way to inexpensively create nutrient rich fertilizer for gardens or landscaping by recycling much of your kitchen and yard waste. In fact, you can prevent more than 25 percent of your waste from going to a landfill when you use a composter.

When you use a rain barrel, you conserve water by using rain rather than water (which you pay for) from a spigot. Further, because Oakdale has a permanent odd-even watering ban, a rain barrel allows you to apply water to your lawn anytime. And, the water is naturally soft, devoid of minerals, chlorine, fluoride and other chemicals, making it great for plants, lawns and gardens.

CEE offers two loan programs for financing home energy improvements: the Home Energy Loan Program and the MHFA Fix-up Fund. Loans are low-interest or are offered at below-market interest rates. Funds acquired from CEE can be used for geothermal projects (ground or air source heat pumps for heating and cooling), for home improvements related to increasing energy efficiency, or for installing photovoltaic (PV) solar technology. HELP KEEP SPRING RUN-OFF CLEAN

As snow melts and spring rains arrive, water runoff funnels from streets and driveways straight into storm sewers and into lakes, rivers and wetlands, carrying grease, oil, bacteria, nutrients, sediment and other contaminants with it. Did you know that storm water runoff is likely the leading cause of water pollution? Here are some ideas for how you can do your part to keep our waters clean.

- Direct water from downspouts onto the lawn, away from your house and paved surfaces.
- Remove debris (leaves, branches, trash) from the storm drains near your home, particularly after a rainstorm.
- Avoid raking debris (leaves, grass, sand and dirt) from your lawn into the street.
- Don't apply lawn care products to frozen ground; wait until the grass starts growing. And then sweep up and reuse any lawn care products that fall on streets, sidewalks and driveways.
- Clean your lawn and garden equipment on the grass, rather than on hard surfaces, in the gutter, or over storm drains.
- Sweep up soil and grass clippings. Never wash or blow them into the street.
- Remember the new Minnesota Fertilizer Law: fertilizers containing phosphorus cannot be used on residential lawns in Minnesota. The middle number on a bag of fertilizer should say zero.
- Storm drains carry trash from your street to a lake or river, even if it's miles away. Seal your trash bags and keep litter out of the street.
- Pet waste is full of harmful nutrients and bacteria, especially when it washes into lakes and rivers. Pick up after your pet and put it in the trash.
- Keep your car regularly maintained so fluids don't leak on the street. Just one quart of oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water. Take used motor oil to a neighborhood drop-off site.

THIS JUST IN:

At their January 12 meeting, the Oakdale City Council initiated a "Quiet Zone" study. The purpose of the study is to determine the feasibility of a project to reduce the use of train whistles / horns in Oakdale. Quiet zones are allowed provided safety improvements are made to railroad crossings; there are four such crossings in Oakdale. The study involves the coordinated efforts of several other entities. As such, if the project is determined to be feasible, it could take at least two years to complete.

Also on January 12, representatives from the Minnesota Department of Health provided an update to the City Council on the third biomonitoring study conducted in the east metro. The results showed a continuing decrease in contamination levels following the steps taken to filter out pollution.
